End-of-Year Letter to Parents Reflections and Farewell



Dear NBIS Parents,

As we approach the end of this year, it is a fitting time to reflect on our journey and achievements. Following three challenging years of the pandemic, we have emerged stronger and more resilient, ready to embrace new beginnings.

The board expressed satisfaction with the Senior Leadership Team's reports and their unwavering commitment to enhancing teaching and learning, student and staff wellbeing, and enriching the curriculum, making it more vibrant and comprehensive. The board commended the tremendous efforts of all NBIS staff in creating a lively and supportive community, recognising everyone's dedication and hard work.

This year, we successfully implemented the Cambridge CEM admissions assessments in Primary and student progress assessments in Maths and English, realigning them with the Cambridge boundaries. For the first time at NBIS, we introduced student progress trackers for Primary and Early Years, marking a significant milestone in our commitment to academic excellence. We also initiated a comprehensive review of school policies, including safeguarding, behaviour and admissions policies, ensuring our standards remain high and relevant.

In our continuous effort to support all students, we reviewed ESL needs and requirements. We have planned an ESL Primary programme for 2024-2025. Moreover, achieved 100% of all staff on Level 1 safeguarding training for all NBIS staff and initiated safeguarding requirements and training for external vendors. This year, we also celebrated our first Children's Day for Primary and Early Years, continued with the flagship events, UN Day and the Fall Festival and resumed an even bigger and better Book Fair/Book Week with a visiting author, and participated in the inaugural NBIS Primary Musical, all of which were resounding successes.

Our commitment to holistic education was evident through introducing the PSHE curriculum, continued participation in the Formula 1 for Schools programme, and investment in an F1 track for Secondary and Primary (Year 6) STEM ECA. We also continued our tradition of outdoor education excursions for both Primary and Secondary students, with outstanding success on both trips and enjoyment by all students. Additionally, we have initiated contact with overseas educational institutions to broaden our students' horizons and opportunities. We have initiated a comprehensive review of policies and processes across the school in preparation for the CIS accreditation visit, which is due this November 18th. We have also secured the approval of the Gym roof construction, scheduled to be completed in the summer and ready for use at the start of next semester. Students and staff will truly enjoy the full use of the gym during the rainy season, a milestone as a result of WEG's vision and strive for educational excellence.

The Senior Leadership Team introduced the first comprehensive survey for parents and staff this year, and we thank you for your time and valuable feedback. Your insights and perspectives are crucial in helping the SLT understand what we are doing well and where we can improve. The survey results will guide the Senior Leadership Team in making informed decisions and implementing changes to enhance the learning environment and overall experience at NBIS. The SLT is committed to continuous improvement and ensuring that NBIS remains a place where every student can thrive academically, socially, and emotionally.

As I prepare to leave NBIS, I am grateful for my colleagues and community's unwavering support and trust this year. It has been an honour to serve this wonderful community. Although my time here is coming to an unexpected end, I remain confident that NBIS will continue to thrive and reach even greater heights.

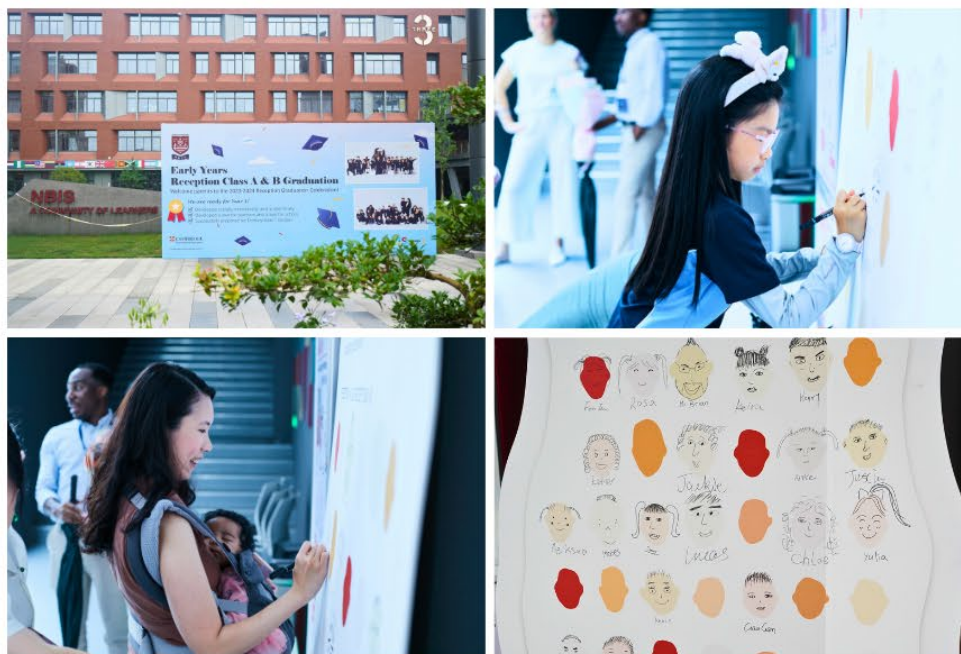
Early Years Graduation Ceremony

The Great AI Debate: Y9A vs. Y9B on Regulating Artificial Intelligence

In a lively and engaging debate, Year 9 students from classes Y9A and Y9B recently faced off on regulating artificial intelligence (AI). The debate, which took place in the school conference room, saw Y9A arguing against the idea of strict AI regulations, while Y9B presented a case in favor of such measures. Both teams made compelling arguments, but in the end, it was Y9A who emerged victorious.

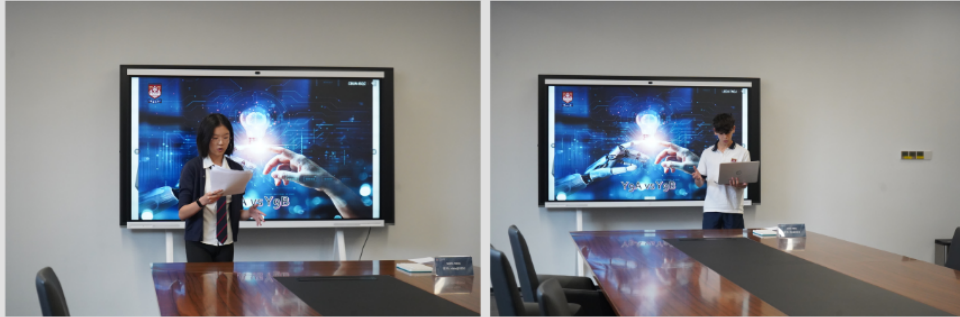


Y9A: ADVOCATING FOR AI'S POTENTIAL

Y9A, led by their eloquent captain, began their argument by highlighting the transformative potential of AI in various sectors, particularly in healthcare. They painted a picture of a future where AI could assist doctors in diagnosing diseases with unparalleled accuracy, potentially saving millions of lives. The team emphasized that strict regulations could stifle innovation and delay the development of life-saving technologies.

"Imagine a world where AI can predict and diagnose conditions like cancer at an early stage, giving patients a fighting chance," argued one of the Y9A debaters. "Strict regulations could slow down this progress and keep us from realizing these benefits."

Y9A also touched on the role of AI in dangerous occupations. They pointed out that AI could be used in fields such as mining, firefighting, and bomb disposal, where human lives are at significant risk. By working alongside AI, humans could reduce their exposure to these dangers.

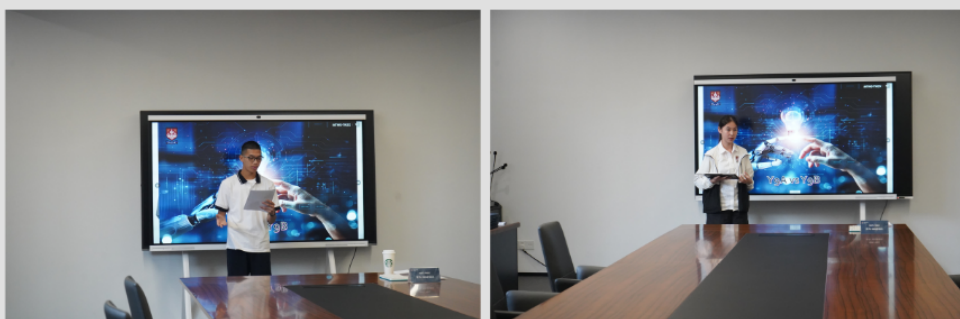


Y9B: THE CASE FOR REGULATION

On the other side of the debate, Y9B presented a strong case for the necessity of regulating AI. Their arguments centered on data security and the potential for AI to increase human laziness. The team expressed concerns that without proper regulations, AI systems could be vulnerable to cyber-attacks, leading to data breaches and misuse of personal information.

"Data security is a critical issue in the age of AI," a Y9B debater asserted. "Without strict regulations, we risk exposing sensitive information to hackers and malicious entities. This could have severe consequences for individuals and organizations alike."

Y9B also argued that over-reliance on AI could lead to a decline in human skills and motivation. They warned that as AI systems become more capable, people might become overly dependent on them, leading to increased laziness and a lack of initiative.



THE VERDICT

Both teams presented well-researched and thought-provoking arguments, making it a tough decision for the judges. However, Y9A's optimistic vision of AI's potential to revolutionize healthcare and improve safety in dangerous occupations ultimately swayed the judges in their favor.

The debate concluded with a round of applause for both teams, acknowledging their hard work and dedication to understanding a complex and important issue. The judges commended Y9A for their persuasive arguments and forward-thinking approach, while also recognizing Y9B for their valid concerns and the need for balanced regulations.

Intermediate Biology Olympiad 2024

In June, 9 NBIS students from Years 11 & 12 entered the 2024 Intermediate Biology Olympiad to compete alongside over 14000 students from over 700 schools worldwide. The Intermediate Biology Olympiad tests students on content that they will have covered in IGCSE and AS Level Biology, as well as presenting some unfamiliar topics and problem-solving questions. The competition consists of one multiple-choice paper which is sat online under exam conditions.

SECONDARY OUTDOOR EDUCATION

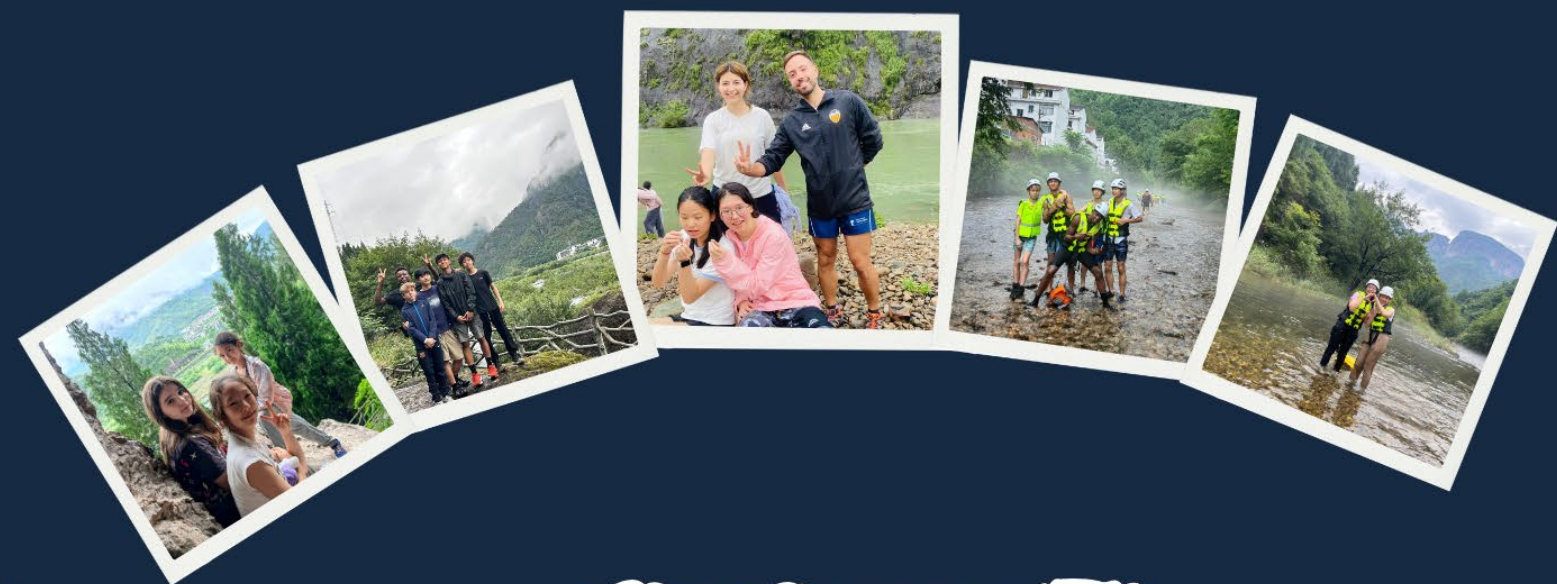

Couple of more brave students with deep sense for adventure carried on in the river for another kilometer, while the others had a chance to dry up and rest in the comfort of the bus.



Last night belonged to the bonfire: singing songs (even Mr Dani Gomez as Taylor Swift made his promised appearance), playing games, and enjoying the typical roasted marshmallows.

Overall, very enjoyable week, filled with laughter, camaraderie, joy and physical challenges.

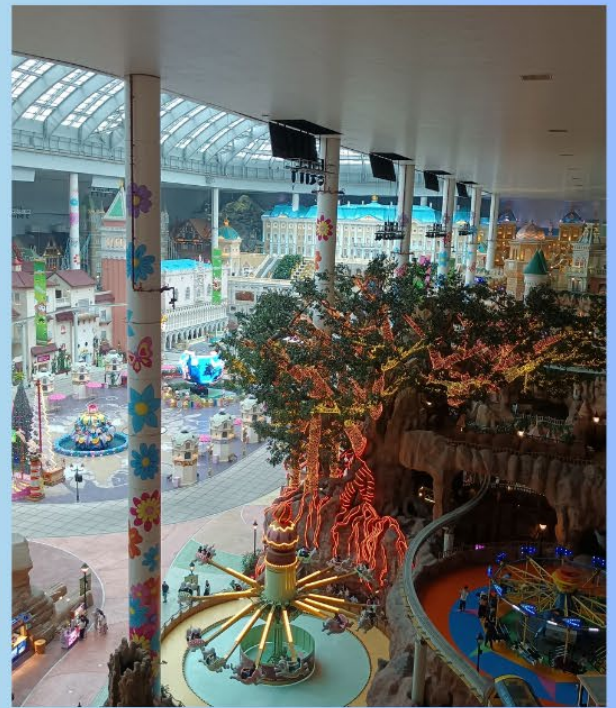
