The semester is in full swing and I would like to remind you of two important upcoming events in school.

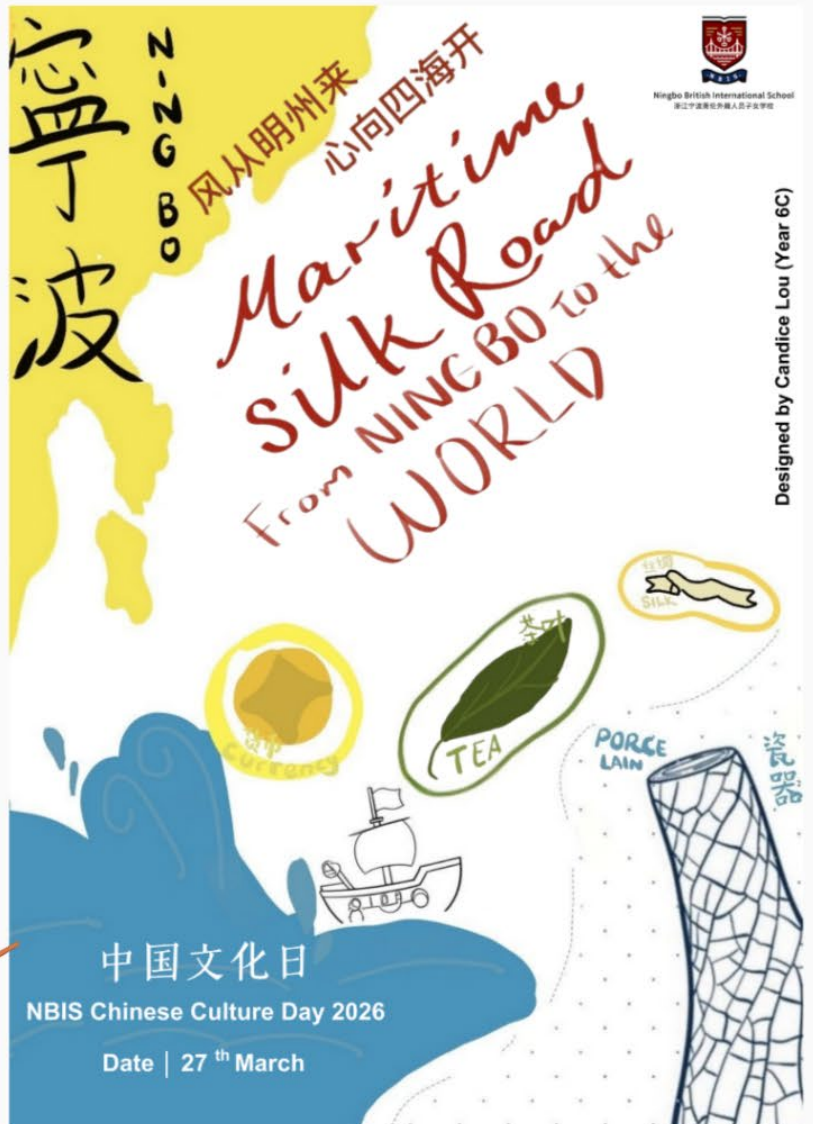
Chinese Culture Day

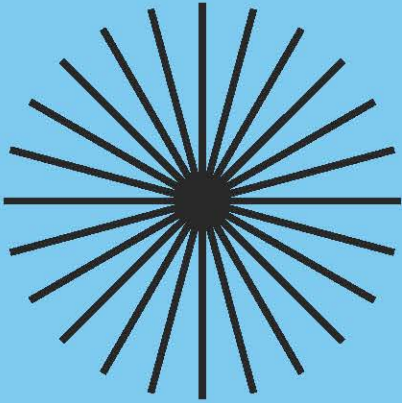

ABOUT THE READ-A-THON

The Secondary Read-A-Thon will take place from March 9th to April 9th.

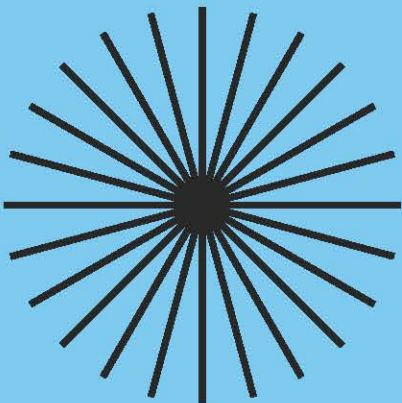


The secondary students have been challenged to read as many books as possible while raising money for a community animal charity. Students can collect sponsors for every book they read for the read-a-thon.



Friends and family can sponsor the number of books students read. Sponsors can pledge any monetary amount, e.g., 1 RMB per book or a flat amount. The reader is responsible for collecting the donations.

The books read need to be level-appropriate. English teachers must sign off on each book.



All proceeds will then be donated to a local animal charity called 'Stray Don't Cry'- an active charity that provides care to abandoned pets in Ningbo.

MAKE A PLEDGE

Pledge to encourage reading and raise money for a local animal charity. The NBIS read-a-thon will take place between March 9th and April 9th, 2026.

There are two ways to pledge:

1. You could sponsor a student for a flat amount. If you pledge a flat donation of 20RMB, no matter how much the student reads, you will owe 20RMB.
2. You can pledge an amount for books read. For example, a student reads five books over the course of the read-a-thon. If you sponsored this student for 5RMB per book, you would owe $5 \times 5\text{RMB} = 25\text{RMB}$. You may limit any donation; just indicate that on the sponsor form.



THE READ-A-THON IS CONTINUING THROUGH MARCH HERE ARE SOME TIPS ON HOW TO ENCOURAGE YOUR CHILDREN TO READ

Reading is an essential skill that children will use daily for the rest of their lives. While children learn to read at school, parents can enhance the experience by offering support at home. One way of doing this is to encourage your child to participate in the read-a-thon and check their reading progress.

Tips for parents:

- **Encourage your child to read level-appropriate books.** If a book is too difficult, your child might lose interest or think reading is too hard.
- **Listen to your child read out loud.** Point to difficult words as your child reads so you can check their understanding.
- **Relate the story to real life.** Talk to your child about the book they are reading and answer their questions about how it may be important to their lives.
- **Read more difficult books.** Challenge your child to read more difficult books once they are confident in reading.
- **Praise your child's reading and make reading time part of your family's daily routine.**

Blossoming Together at NBIS

What settling-in superstars our Preschool learners have been!

Starting our new spring topic, we have welcomed three new friends to our preschool community. Our established preschool students quickly noticed that their friends were new to school and shared their confidence in familiar routines, modelling behaviours, supporting their new friends, and gently leading the way in routines, games and healthy habits. Their awareness of others' needs helped the new children feel safe and included, while giving students a sense of pride and confidence in their own abilities and helping others.

Students reassured each other with kind gestures. They shared reassuring words, offered tissues and held hands, guiding and demonstrating how to manage routines including morning registration, storing belongings, self-care habits (handwashing, changing shoes, selecting tissues) and seeking help. With peer learning support, new friends quickly recognised that they could ask for help and are now becoming more familiar with healthy school habits and their classmates.

Leaping into spring, Preschoolers have taken responsibility in the playground, inviting friends to join games, and shared their curiosity on nature walks, handling equipment and natural items carefully, keeping one another safe.

Students embraced spring dances, patted down sandcastles together and collected twigs and equipment carefully, arranging them safely into shapes and pictures. They have impressed teachers with their growing independence, sense of pride, and awareness of space.



A Sense of Community:

Back in the classroom, Preschool's curiosity and teamwork continued. Students have been confident communicators, expressing their preferences in spring-themed discussions and sharing ideas within their group. They discussed what they would like to find on scavenger hunts (bugs and birds!), talked about the weather daily (splashing in muddy puddles is a favourite!) and shared their favourite books (There's a Dragon in my School).

Preschoolers exercised their fine motor control, taking turns to water, prepare, and carefully chop vegetables, whilst learning about healthy habits in hygiene and hydration. They shared spaces and freshly roasted treats well, working together side by side, celebrating efforts along the way.

Through these games and activities, students have begun to develop skills in taking turns and waiting, while also problem-solving, communicating and showing kindness to one another as they explored and created together.

With our spring start blossoming so well, we are excited for the community celebrations and adventures ahead. There will be a book-themed dress-up day, a team-building sports day and a fun-filled Children's Day this summer.

Well done, Preschoolers! You have made a tremendous start to semester two, showing kindness, curiosity and teamwork. You are all settling-in superstars!



4A Science and Geography

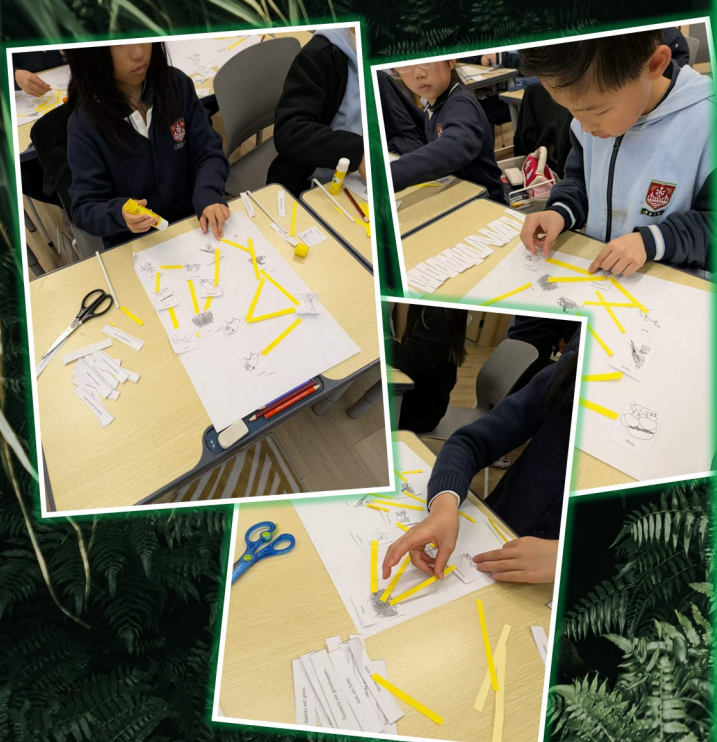

Year 4 have been busy exploring both science and geography this term through their fascinating topic on life processes and ecosystems, with a special focus on rainforests.

We have been investigating how living things are adapted to their environments and describing these adaptations in scientific detail, identifying where different organisms sit within a food chain.

Children have done lots of independent research, using both texts and online resources to find out about a variety of animals and have really impressed us with their ability to gather information and present their findings clearly to their peers.

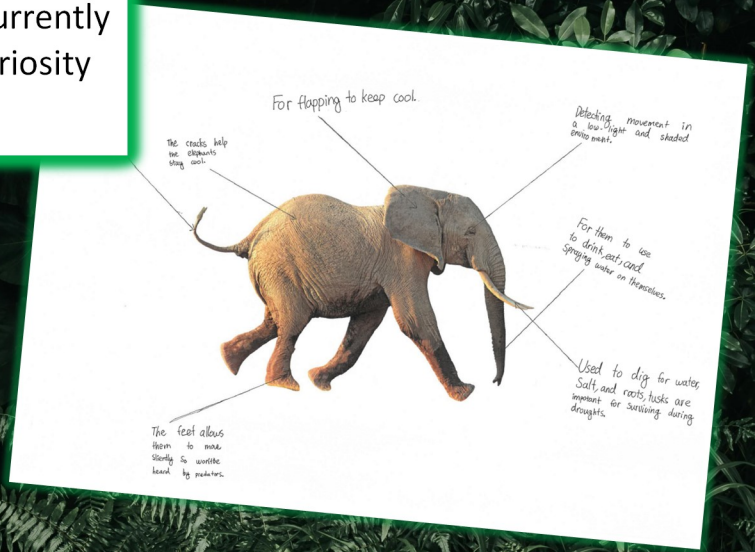
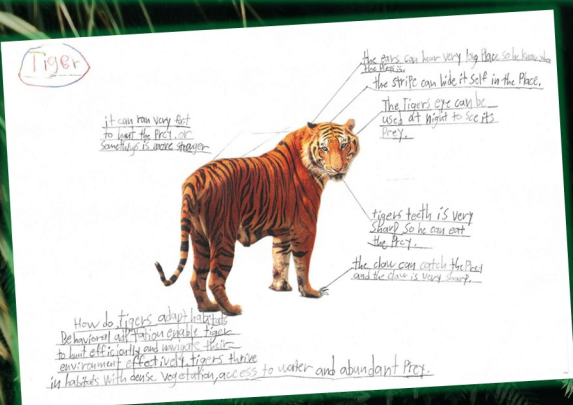

Primary Assembly



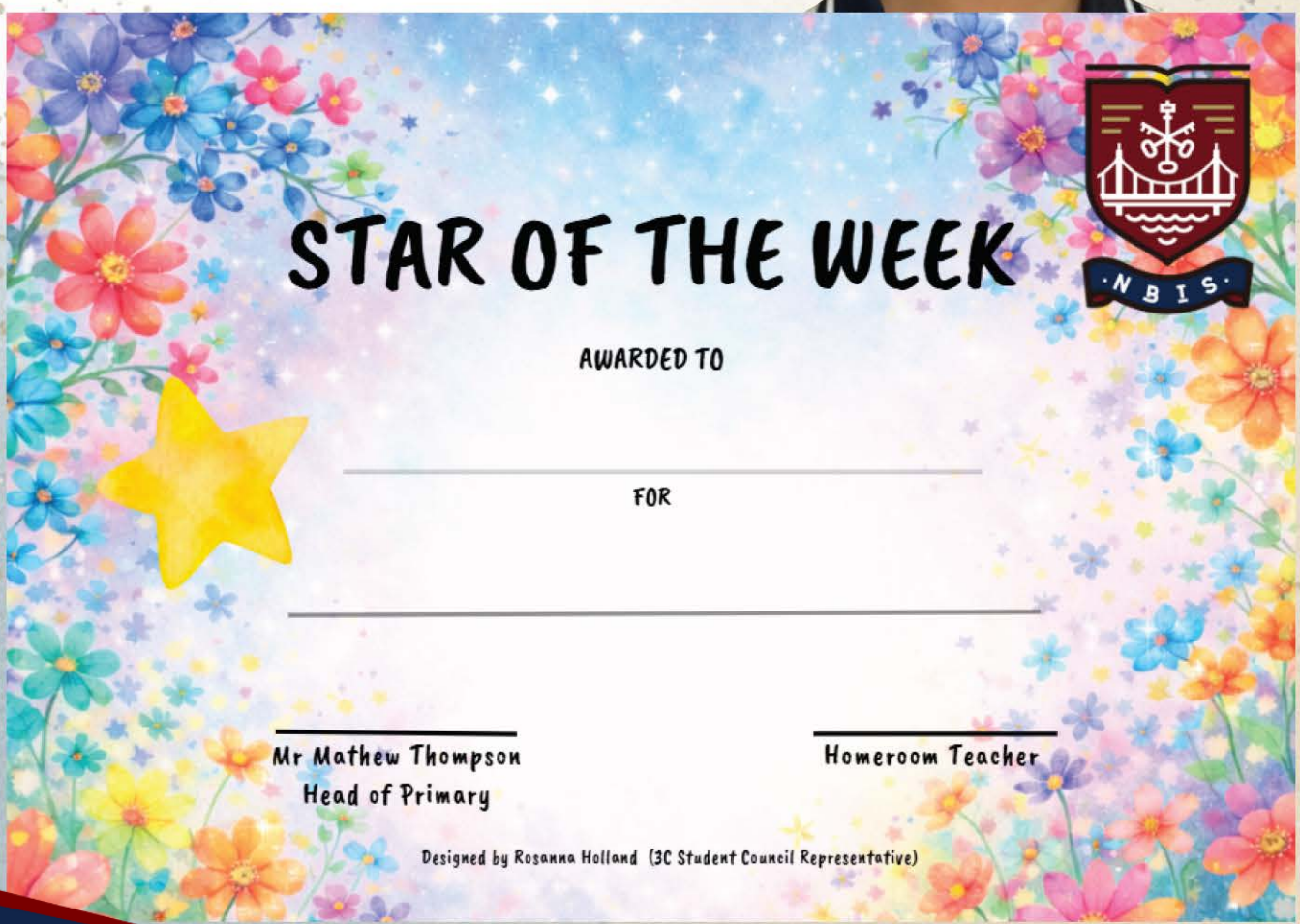

I think we should have a design full of beautiful rainbow-coloured flowers. Some as tall as tree branches and some as small as specks of stardust.

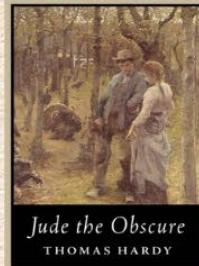


A LEVEL LITERATURE CLASS VICTORIAN LITERATURE WEEK

From the beginning of March till the end of it the students from the A Level Literature class will be working on the novel "Jude the Obscure" by the English writer Thomas Hardy (also "The Mayor of Casterbridge", "Tess of the d'Urbervilles", etc.). Hardy was one of the most eminent representatives of the Victorian period of English literature, named after Queen Victoria (1837–1901), the longest-reigning monarch in UK history. In order to get better acquainted with this essential chapter from literature and history, and also to get introduced to other more or less prominent writers from the period, students were given a task to prepare a presentation on Victorian Literature.



The presentations covered a wide range of themes and authors, with all the established names from classic fiction (Charles Dickens, the Bronte Sisters, William Thackeray, etc.), poetry (Alfred Lord Tennyson, Christina Rossetti, Robert Browning, etc.), and drama (Oscar Wilde, George Bernard Shaw, etc.) adequately covered, including some of the progenitors of the popular literary genres (Arthur Conan Doyle, Robert Louis Stevenson, etc.). Those were fascinating but also turbulent times, with the world's favourite detective Sherlock Holmes both shaking hands and bumping heads with harsh explorations on social realism and the not always benevolent impact from the rampant Industrial Revolution. Didactic musings on morals and faith were vehemently colliding with the rise of scientific rationalism, this last current strongly boosted by Charles Darwin's "On the Origin of Species", with vestiges of the past Romantic period (gothic/supernatural fiction) still finding sizeable audience among the more sensation-fixated fractions of the population.

Interesting discussions took place during the presentations, with students displaying their preferences for a particular author, with some seminal works receiving both accolades and (surprisingly) criticism, not to mention the new pieces of information that the students discovered with regard to the period and some of its more obscure representatives. It was good to see their immersion and avid interest in this significant moment from world literature, with everyone taking this task seriously, and not only as another way to additionally prepare for the coming exams in May.

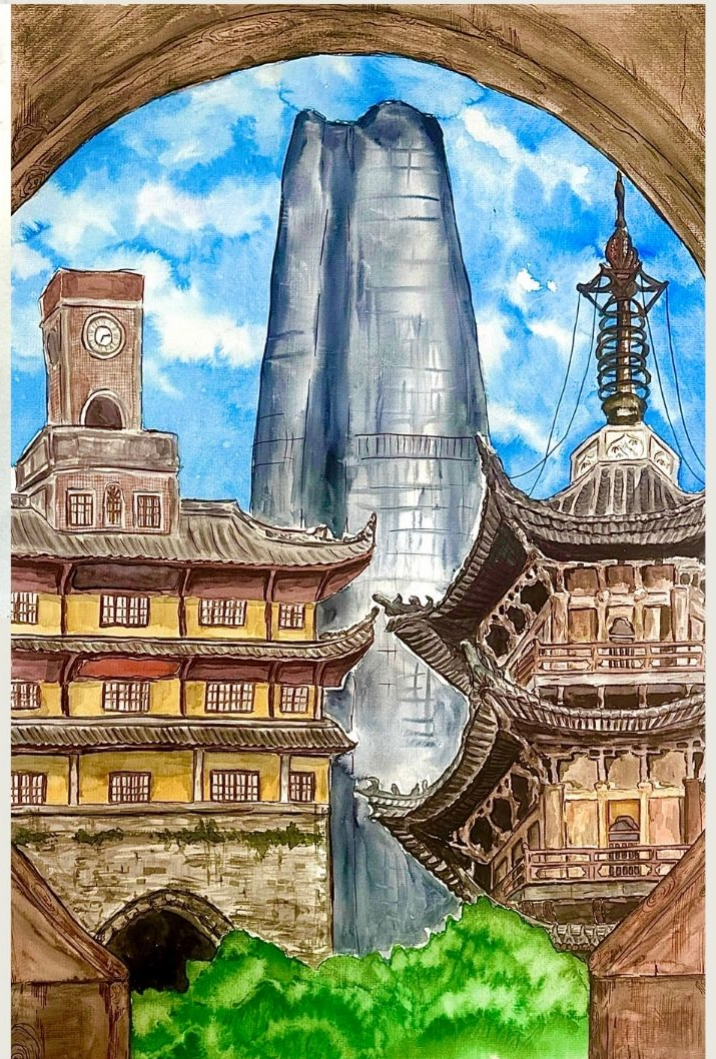
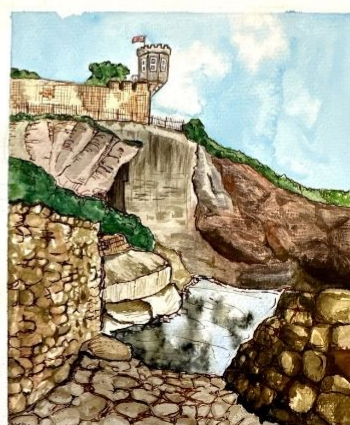
